Executive Summary

Our congregation is a small community celebrating both the Prayer Book Liturgy and the Eastern Byzantine Liturgy on alternating Sundays. We are currently using St. Peter and St. Mary's Church in Denver, along with the congregation which has been there. As a "bi-ritual" community trying to "breath with both lungs" and celebrating services in both Western and Eastern forms, we are quite unique within both the Episcopal Church and the wider Anglican Communion. An article about our work recently appeared in *The Living Church*, and an ecumenical group in Chicago has asked for our help in trying to begin something similar to what we are doing.

While the congregation is small, members are very committed to each other and to the work of the community, especially to its liturgical life. We have had Ukrainian eggpainting workshops, and we have an engaged group of musicians, iconographers, servers and readers, as well as one young person seeking ordination. Homilies on Sundays are dialogical, giving members a way of actively reflecting together on the readings of Sacred Scripture. Liturgy is tied closely to social involvement. Each year during both Advent and Great Lent, money and needed items are collected on a weekly basis for various organizations involved in social work, e.g., *The Gathering Place* in Denver. Congregants also participated this year in a *Habitat for Humanity* building project.

Our congregation is really an ecumenical experiment, rooted in a long and positive historical relationship between Anglicanism and Eastern Orthodoxy. As an "inclusive orthodox" community, we are striving to ground our discipleship and following of Jesus in the common traditions of Christianity before the Great Schism of East and West and also to respond to the Spirit's promptings with regard to various contemporary issues and developments in our own day.
