OUR COMMUNITY ASPEN AND THE ROARING FORK VALLEY

Aspen, a premier ski resort in Colorado, is much more than a vacation destination. With about 6,600 permanent residents and attracting approximately 6,000 tourists per day in summer and winter peak seasons, it retains a welcoming small-town charm that makes it a wonderful place to live and raise a family.

History & Spirit

Founded in the 1880's as a silver mining town, Aspen was revitalized in the 1940's by Elizabeth and Walter Paepcke, who envisioned "The Aspen Idea" - a community that nurtures mind, body and spirit.

Today

Today Aspen continues to embody that vision, with 300 days of sunshine to boot. It offers:

- World-renowned insitutions like The Aspen Institute, Aspen Music Festival and School, and Anderson Ranch Ars Center, drawing visitors and cultural leaders from around the globe.
- Excellent schools, with Aspen High School ranked in the top 5% nationwide.
- Year-round outdoor activities skiing, hiking, biking, rafting, fishing, and more alongside family-friendly amenities like parks, a recreation center, and summer camps.
- Convenient services, including an airport just three miles from town, Aspen Valley Health two miles from downtown, and extensive bus service through the Roaring Fork Transit Authority.
- A strong commitment to affordable housing to help offset the high cost of living.

Aspen's mix of full-time residents, seasonal neighbors, and international visitors creates a vibrant, energetic community - rooted in traditions and with endless possibilites.

OUR CHURCH

WHERE WE HAVE BEEN

Christ Episcopal Church was established in 1884 when Aspen was a thriving mining town. The town had seen tremendous growth due to the discovery of silver in nearby mountains. The silver crash of the 1890s caused a decline in population and economic activity. The church building was moved to Marble, a town about 60 miles away, in 1908. The building is still there, now a community congregation. The "quiet years" ensued in Aspen until the advent of skiing in the late 1940s.

In the 1950s services were held in a miner's cabin. In 1960 land was donated by a couple active in the church. The architectural design was a gift from another parishioner -- a rather unusual one at that. The new church building opened in 1962. Shortly after, property was purchased next door, and a rectory was constructed and occupied in the late 1960s.

In the 1960s and 1970s, Aspen came alive as did the church. These were active times at Christ Episcopal and continued into the first decade of the 21st century. A major renovation of the church was undertaken in 2009. The worship space was expanded and a new fellowship hall was built adjoining the sanctuary. With large doors opening into the sanctuary, this area also serves as overflow seating as needed. A narthex now separates the entrance doors from the sanctuary and a beautiful stained-glass window was installed behind the altar. A chapel was added and the lower level now houses a large multi-function space, offices, and teaching rooms.

In the mid-1980s, Christ Church sponsored the establishment of a parochial mission in nearby Basalt. We assisted in purchasing a building and pursued a major fundraising campaign to renovate the space and to eventually pay off the mortgage. St. Peter's is now an active parish for the mid-valley area about 20 miles from Aspen.

Today, Christ Church is a parish with distinct seasonal attendance. We have members who live in Aspen and other parts of Roaring Fork Valley year-round. We also have many members who live here seasonally, particularly in the summer and also in winter. We have non-peak "shoulder seasons" in the spring and fall, when activity quiets and some businesses close. This makes Christ Church unique among Episcopal Churches in that we essentially have three congregations in one: a year-round congregation, a summer congregation and a winter congregation. We find that even when people are not here for months at a time, they still consider Christ Church their spiritual home.



2019-2021 Period of Transition

Christ Church experienced significant distruption in 2019-2021 resulting in a decline in membership, attendance and finances. Our previous rector left Christ Church in 2019, shortly before the pandemic. The church had been stagnant prior to this rector transition and the succession of supply and interim priests that followed, along with Covid restrictions in 2020-2021 took its toll. The church building was closed for five months in 2020 with limited attendance after that.

In addition to the challenges of the pandemic and rector transition, the parish has dealt with some other trends. The church, and Aspen generally, have seen somewhat of an exodus down valley to communities that are more affordable; this is a particular issue for younger families. Additionally, like many churches, we have a large percentage of our congregation who are older and we have experienced deaths and moves from a number of older parishioners, including a number of substantial donors.

The church began to stabilize and renew in 2021 with the hiring of Bill Lupfer, our current Rector. Worship services in church resumed spiritual vibrancy, ministries and programs were restarted. We learned to embrace technology for both live-streaming worship services and maintaining better connections with parishioners near and far. We welcomed in a number of new members (25 new pledging members since 2022) which helped offset the impact of departing parishioners.




Current Snapshot

Membership

- 85 Active Members down from \sim 180 in 2021 due to moves, deaths, departures and member list scrubbing
- 75 Average Sunday Attendance (includes 10 streaming) varies significantly by season
- Membership breakdown:
 - -57% Primary Residents; 43% Seasonal Residents (Texas accounts for one-third)
 - -80%+ of members are over 50 years old
 - -Primary Residents two-thirds live in Aspen; one-third live down valley or Snowmass
 - -New members are more transitory than typical Parish (typical of Aspen)

Scope of Current Ministries

- Worship strong summer attendance at two services with guest musicians and a number of guest speakers; winter and especially shoulder seansons have weaker attendance
- Study several bible and book study opportunities during the year, often with limited attendance
- Children's Ministry we have invested in a regular Sunday School with sporadic and limited participation
- Hospitality is strong point for Christ Church with First Sunday Breakfasts, summer picnics and other events throughout the year
- Outreach we currently fund the Outreach budget through direct contributions only; additional programs (e.g. Locally Haiti, Feed My Sheep) are highlighted in Sunday services with good donation participation

- We have no debt and have been investing the past few years in building improvements.
- We have connections with the Aspen Music Festival, Aspen Institute and other cultural organizations with the opportunity for deeper collaboration.

Opportunities for Growth:

- Develop and implement strategies to reach, serve and incorporate new people into the life of the church.
- Build the motivation for parishioners to lead and participate in life-long learning.
- Foster a spirit in our congregation that makes people want to discern their gifts and increase personal involvement.
- Make necessary changes to meet the needs of young people and their families.
- Continue broadening our membership base and other contribution sources to counter the financial impact of losing aging large donors.

To strengthen the pastoral response of the church in serving people in need, both within the parish and in the larger community.




To foster a spirit in our congregation that makes people want to get as involved as possible.



Christ Church's 2025 budget is \$690,000. We began the year with a projected \$55,000 deficit, due to pledges of \$415,000 (short of our \$500,000+ goal). In response, we launched the Restore, Replenish, Rejoice! campaign last spring, which raised more than \$90,000 - enough to cover the gap and begin rebuilding reserves. As a result, we now project 2025 will end at breakeven or with a small surplus.

This effort continues a recent pattern of closing shortfalls through special gifts. In 2024, year-end "angels" enabled us to balance the books: in 2023 and 2022, we relied on reserves, designated gifts and bequests. While these measures have sustained us, we know more lasting solutions are needed.



OUR DIOCESE

The Episcopal Church in Colorado

The Episcopal Diocese of Colorado encompasses the entire state of Colorado - around 105,000 square miles - and is comprised of 95 worshiping congregations and nine Diocesan institutions. Our Bishop is The Right Reverend Kym Lucas, who was elected as the 11th Bishop of



Colorado on October 27, 2018 at the 131st Annual Convention of the Diocese. Bishop Lucas was consecrated as our bishop on May 18, 2019 at St. John's Cathedral in Denver. Bishop Kym is the first female bishop as well as the first African American bishop in the Diocese of Colorado's 132-year history.

Christ Church is blessed with a comfortable Rectory adjacent to the church. The house is two stories with a full finished, large basement. The home features four bedrooms and four baths. This year we made repairs including a new boiler, kitchen renovations, painting throughout, renovation of the master bathroom, and new carpeting throughout. There is a small, useable back yard and parking spaces for two cars in addition to on-street parking. Aspen's excellent public schools are just a few miles away as is skiing at Aspen's four ski mountains.
